rosecat coffee company

Imagine a quaint coffee shop, filled with patrons laughing and smiling, enjoying their lattes and mochas, some browsing a bookshelf, some seated on comfy chairs, and the majority of employees behind the counter taking orders, making drinks, and serving up joyful conversation have special needs.

Coffee Connections Collective Change

That is the mantra for The Rose Cat Coffee Company and Reading Society, a new and simply phenomenal small business here in Lincoln.

The coffee shop opened at the end of April and was featured this month on a Channel 10/11 news story, along with appearing on the cover of the Journal Star. It is located just north of 48th and Old Cheney in the business complex also housing Stauffer's Pie Shoppe. It is open 7am - 4pm Monday through Saturday and closed on Sunday.

Rose Cat employs a terrific staff, including a number of young adults from our DSAF membership, that will pride themselves on taking your order and being your barista.

As a parent and as the current Board President of the DSAF, this job concept is something that I have hoped and dreamed about - a rare business model focused on inclusion and awareness wrapped into a positive aura inside the store. It has the right ideals, the right expectations, accompanied by the right supports for barista and customer success. Coffee shops with a similar model are dotted across the country, but the closest is probably a long drive to Colorado. This is a true gem for the city and state.

Brenda Kasaty, founder and owner had an amazing vision to open this venture in-part to actively increase employment numbers for individuals with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (IDD). Nationwide, only 20% of individuals with IDD are employed.

Brenda is a change champion, not just dreaming of a business foundation focusing on employing individuals with special needs – but stepping forward and making it happen. She is a wife, mother, a licensed social worker, former PARA, and adaptive athlete coach, with a passion for changing the way individuals with IDD are treated, valued, accepted, seen, and integrated into their community.

The WHY behind Rose Cat Coffee Company:

- a) Inclusivity,
- b) Employs and empowers individuals with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities,
- c) Fosters community connections between baristas and customers

This purposeful design allows for a memorable experience instead of just a mindless hand-reach through a drive-thru window for a coffee.

"I hold the bar high for my employees, because I know what they can do," says Brenda. "I want them to take ownership of their work. That is empowering. It gives them a new sense of confidence. And, that breaks down barriers with the community, showing customers the potential that all individuals have when you provide the right opportunities."

Brenda designed all aspects of the shop to allow success for her baristas. They have a scaled-down drink menu, with one size for hot drinks and one size for cold drinks. This keeps the recipes manageable for baristas to create, even with some simple visual chart reminders on the wall. She is finding the right balance of support and independence.

The staff makes their own syrups right in the shop, along with a selection of tasty baked goods. Their coffee beans are ethically sourced and roasted by a local business, Hardy Coffee. The bookshelves are stocked with donated titles that you can read on the comfy seating or just take with you (thus the rest of the business title - "and reading society").

How can DSAF members help?

The DSAF doesn't just want members to pop-in once to see this unique coffee shop experience. Please make regular visits by:

- making this your new Monday morning coffee routine on the way to work,
- making this your new place to meet with your friend on Thursday afternoon,
- · making this your committee working spot once a month,
- making this your Saturday morning relaxing reading spot with a vanilla latte'

This is such a grand opportunity for Lincoln and even more-so for our DSAF community. Our Board of Directors connected with Brenda early-on and wants to find ways to partner to allow Rose Cat to THRIVE. We would love this shop to grow and expand to offer even more employment opportunities for our membership, and to spread the positive awareness through the community about the amazing abilities of individuals with Down syndrome and others with IDD.


The ultimate goal is for customers to leave with a positive feeling (and a beverage) that they can take with them into their day.
